# REZONING HEARING - 1<sup>ST</sup> OF 3 SCHEDULED

The first of three hearings for Copt Brock Bridge Properties to present to the Board of Appeals was held August 3<sup>rd</sup>. Copt is requesting the Board overturn the decision of Douglas Clark Hollman in his denial to rezone the property from SB (small business) to W1 (warehouse industrial.)

The first hearing gave Copt the opportunity to present their case before the board. Their lawyer introduced "expert witnesses" and JIA attorney, Ryan Kennedy did a fantastic job during his opportunity for cross examination.

The second hearing is scheduled for October 19<sup>th</sup>, 5:30 pm and the third, November 1<sup>st</sup>. It is important for the members of our community to have a voice. JIA volunteers will be coming around soon with a petition for you to sign if you would like the property to stay small business.

When both sides have presented their case the public will have an opportunity to speak. It would be advantageous to have as many people from the community to attend as possible.

We attend zoning hearings, speak at County Council meetings on your behalf, and strive to keep you informed.



### WOMEN'S PRISON IN JESSUP

I, along with fellow JIA member, Fred Steffens had the privlidge of touring the women's prison recently. Our tour began with a search, much like you get at the airport, with a metal scanner and pat down. We signed in and left our drivers licenses at the front desk.

Warden, Margaret Chippendale lead us first to the education building. All of the women entering prison must undergo educational testing and spend their 1<sup>st</sup> 120 days at school. After completing the mandatory days an imates are encouraged to continue their education. School consists working toward obtaining a GED, earning college credits through a program offered by Goucher College, remedial reading and writing classes, and instruction on life skills. Warden Chippendale said there are inmates who need to learn even the basics of health and hygine. The school is complete with a library (they would love donations of books) and computers for testing.

Our tour continued to a housing unit. Each 2 person cell cell was around 10' x 6' with a locker for possesions. Women were cleaning, doing laundry, and one inmate brought her cat to meet us! The prison has a dog and cat program where dogs are forstered to learn skills for the disabled.

The next stop was in the work area. Here we spoke with inmates proud to have coveted jobs earned with good behavior. The prison has an architectural design department where the women learn CAD programing to design spaces for other State buildings. We were proudly shown a space designed for Frederick College. This was not only designed and priced for renovation, but each element was color coated to indicate another facility that would take part in the construction, like the men's prison, who would be building some of the funiture. This is a job that takes education, skill, and dedication.

Your license tags and renewal stickers come from the women's prison. Flags are sewn there along with uniforms.

The Women's Correctional Institution is not an idle palce. It has it's problems as would any correctional institute but Warden Chippendale is striving to improve the lives of the women serving time there. She believes the women deserve an opportunity to use the time they are serving to better their station and help the women achieve a level a success when their time at the Correctional Institution is at an end.

Many thanks to Warden Chippendale for providing this informative tour.

## BWI AND FAA METROPLEX/NEXTGEN

Most people are accustomed to the daily road traffic in their neighborhoods. Now imagine that surrounding roads are closed off and all traffic must now drive by your house 24/7. That analogy is what it is like for people living under the path of the new FAA NextGen system.

You may not find your home on the above maps above but these pictures show departures from BWI airport before and after NextGen that fly over the Jessup area. Flights have gone from a widely dispersed pattern, as seen in yellow, to a narrow pattern, shown in red. This means flights are flying over someone's home every 90 SECONDS and at lower altitudes.

Citizens and political representatives across the country have banded together to encourage FAA to revert to the old flight pattern so people living under this new "superhighway in the sky" are not exposed to the additional noise and air pollution. A "roundtable group" has formed in our area to address the issues and work with FAA. This group is slowly making progress. The Roundtable meets the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month, 7:00 pm at the Maryland Aviation Administration offices. 991 Corporate Blvd. Linthicum. Assemble Rooms A/B. The public is welcome.

One way YOU can help is to report low flying, loud, or frequent aircraft. When FAA administers their changes they could shift more flights to areas that are now **NOT** filing any complaints. These complaints are being counted and plotted and will effect future flight path decisions. 

JIA has good news! Eastbound Rt. 175 will be getting a new turning lane on to Wigley Avenue and a left hand turn lane traffic signal!


They have received sketch plan approval from the county and are awaiting final approval. This could take up to 1 year.
